GENERAL RULES

102 Years: Coronado Flower Show, 1922-2024

- The Coronado Flower Show is a Standard Flower Show and conforms to the standards and objectives of the National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC). The <u>Handbook</u> <u>for Flower Shows</u> (HB), <u>2017 Edition</u>, with any revisions or corrections listed on The NGC Website, is the authority for all issues not covered by the schedule which is The Law of The Show.
- 2. Competition is open to any amateur gardener or designer. There is no fee to enter. All Design Division entries require pre-registration.
- 3. No exhibitor will be permitted more than one entry in each class. Exceptions: in the Horticultural Division, one entry of each variety may be entered, and in the orchid and bonsai sections, where more than one entry of each variety may be entered. In the Floral Arts, Botanical Photography where two entries per class with a total of five entries may be entered.
- Entry cards are available for pickup at Coronado Public Library; CFA, Crown Club and Bridge & Bay Club meetings and events starting in February 2024.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to fill out entry cards in advance in pencil. Bringing a list of all entries with the required entry card information on the day of the show is helpful as well.
- Entries will be received on Friday, April 19th, from 4 pm to 6 pm, and Saturday, April 20th from 7 am to 9 am.
- All entries <u>must</u> be picked up on Sunday, April 21st at 4 pm; except for roses and cut flowers, which will be sold. The exhibit areas must be cleared by 9:45 am on Saturday.
- 8. Judging will begin promptly at 10 am.
- 9. Section Chairs for each Division checks exhibits for conformity to the schedule prior to judging. Final determination for conformance is the judges' responsibility.
- The Flower Show Chairs and Division Chairs shall be present during the judging.
 They, along with Judges and Clerks, are the only personnel on the floor during judging.
- 11. Decisions of the judges are final. Awards may be withheld if not merited. The NGC standard system of awards will be used for all competitive judging. Only one first place (blue) ribbon per class or subclass with a score of 90+; only one second (red) ribbon with a score of 85+; only one third (yellow) ribbon with a score of 80+; and one or more honorable mention (white) ribbons with a score of 75+ may be awarded in each class or subclass, if merited. (Handbook, pg. 5)
- 12. Emphasis is on <u>fresh plant materials</u>. No artificial plant material is permitted in any Division. Flora on the California Garden Clubs Conservation List may be used <u>only</u> in the special exhibits division and must have been lawfully collected or grown by the exhibitor. (<u>www.californiagardenclubs.com</u>).
- The Coronado Floral Association will not assume liability for loss of or damage to any entry or container. Personal property must be properly identified.
- 14. Award presentation will be on Sunday, April 21, at 3 pm at the bandstand.
- 15. The show will be open to the public on Saturday, April 20, from 1 pm to 5 pm and on Sunday, April 21, from 10 am to 4 pm.
- 16. No pets are allowed inside the flower show or in Spreckels Park (City of Coronado Municipal Code, Title 32-Animal Regulations). This includes pets on leash, in baskets or carried. <u>Owner must have documentation for Service Dogs and be prepared to show it</u>. **NO PETS ALLOWED**.

NGC Award of Horticultural Excellence (Highest Score - all Horticulture)

HORTICULTURE RULES

- 1. Flower show general rules apply. The NGC exhibit policies are printed in the *Handbook for Flower Shows*, Chapter 6, Exhibiting in The Horticulture Division.
 - All plant material must be **fresh**.
 - All exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor for no fewer than 90 days.
 - Plant materials must be in their natural state and may not be altered by application (treatment) of oil, commercial "shine" products, etc. that change the natural appearance and color. No wiring of specimens is permitted.
 - Combination plantings must have been grown together for no fewer than 6 weeks.
 - Only foliage naturally grown and still attached to the specimen are permitted in the Flower Show. Unattached foliage is never included with a cut bloom specimen.
 - Pots and plants must be watered, clean and pest free.
- 2. The rules for single species, cut or container-grown specimens are listed in the <u>Handbook for Flower Shows</u> or its supplement, <u>Horticulture Exhibiting and Judging.</u>
- 3. Exhibitors may submit more than one entry per class or subclass if each entry is a different genus, species, variety, cultivar, type, or color. In combination with judges, the Horticulture Division Chair and Section Chairs have the authority to subdivide classes by color, form, size, cultivar, variety or other distinguishing characteristics.
- 4. Each entry must have a completed official entry card and should include the correct botanical name (genus & species), variety, or cultivar. Entry cards may be filled out in advance and should be in pencil. To be eligible for NGC Top Exhibitor Awards entries must include this information. All entries must be registered and given entry numbers before being placed. The same plant may not win the Award of Horticultural Excellence two consecutive years.
- 5. Clear glass containers will be provided for cut specimens. Use of the exhibitor's own clear container is optional. Exhibitors may provide wedging material such as celery or bubble wrap for the container to hold a specimen upright but it should not protrude above the lip of the vase and must allow for the addition of water to the exhibit. Exhibits must not have any foliage below the water line, except Roses & Gladiolus.
- If a plant is considered a flowering plant, it should be exhibited as a flowering specimen. Foliage plants may flower, but should be exhibited as foliage plants if they are grown for their leaves.
- Specimens with a class designation in the schedule may not be entered in the "Any Other" class(es).
- Double potting and top dressing is permitted in all classes. Containers are not to exceed 14" inside diameter unless otherwise specified in the class. No container over 20 pounds. No specimen over 5 feet in height or 30 inches wide.
- 9. Cut flowers and roses are not returned and will be sold at the end of the show.
- 10. The Horticulture Chair and/or a General Show co-chair are free to subdivide classes by color, form, size, cultivate, variety or other distinguishing characteristics.

- 11. To offer NGC Top Exhibitor Awards, there must be a minimum of three (3) classes in each designated section. Classes will be judged by NGC Accredited and student NGC Flower Show Judges and Society Judges.
- 12. The judging scale of points for Flowering Specimens and Specimens with Colorful Bracts (Handbook for Flower Shows, pgs. 129-131) will be utilized.

NGC TOP HORTICULTURE EXHIBITOR AWARDS

AWARD OF HORTICULTURAL EXCELLENCE One Division Award (rosette of blue, orange, and green ribbons) may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibit in the entire Horticulture Division, provided all General and Horticulture Award requirements have been met (*Handbook, pg. 40*).

AWARD OF MERIT Eight Section Awards, (rosette of orange ribbons) may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibits in Sections A, D, E, F, G, K, L, M provided all General and Horticulture Award requirements have been met (*Handbook*, pg. 41).

ARBOREAL AWARD One Section Award (rosette of green ribbons) may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibit in Section I (*Handbook*, pg. 40).

GROWER'S CHOICE AWARD Two Section Awards (rosette of dark green ribbons) may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibits having some common characteristic, e.g. Flowering Container Grown, Foliage Container Grown and/or Combination Planting. Sections B, C, N, O (*Handbook, pg. 41*).

HORTICULTURE SECTIONS AND CLASSES

SECTION A: ROSES

ROSE SECTION RULES

Section judged by American Rose Society Judges

- Rose entries, except for Class 33 (children), must have been grown by the exhibitor and, except for miniature roses, must be shown in containers furnished by the Coronado Floral Association.
- 2. Judging will follow American Rose Society (ARS) criteria.
- All roses must be named. Unnamed or misnamed roses will be penalized. Entries
 must be in the proper class. Entries will normally be displayed in alphabetical order
 of variety name. Each variety in each class shall constitute a separate class to be
 judged separately.
- 4. Entries will be received Friday, April 19th from 4-6 pm and on Saturday, April 20th from 6:30-9 am. Rose entries will NOT be accepted after 9 am. Novices are not restricted to entries only in the novice sections. Placement of rose entries is to be made only by clerks.
- 5. Entry cards and containers are provided. Exhibitors must complete both the top and bottom portion of the entry card.
- Wedging may be added to the container to hold roses upright. An entry may be penalized if wedging material extends above the top of the vase according to the degree of distraction. Wedging must allow for the addition of water to the exhibit.
- 7. No one rose entry may win more than one top award.
- An exhibitor may enter more than one entry in a class, provided that the entries are different varieties.
- 9. A novice is a person who has won no more than three (3) blue ribbons in any rose show. A winner in a Novice Class may no longer enter roses in that class.
- 10. Children who have won the Best Rose in Class 33 award and/or any number of blue ribbons, may continue to enter roses in Class 33. Children may not enter any other class, unless they grow the rose themselves.
- 11. A spray is defined as a "group of florets on a single stem with at least two or more blooms." A bud showing color is not a bloom.
- 12. All entries, other than floating roses and climbing roses, should have a minimum of two sets of five-leaflet leaves, preferably more.
- 13. Any class calling for one bloom must be exhibited without side buds. Exception: one bloom specimens in Old Garden Roses, Climbers and Shrub Roses may be shown with side buds. An exhibitor may remove unwanted growth.
- 14. Stem-on-stem is permitted only in Old Garden Roses and Shrub Roses. In all other classes stem-on-stem entries will be disqualified.
- 15. All entries become the property of the Coronado Floral Show and may be auctioned on Sunday, April 21st at 4 pm.

Most Fragrant Rose

Class 29. One bloom of any rose to be judged 70% on fragrance and 30% on appearance

Floating Roses

- Class 30. One large bloom, no foliage, floated in a round bowl
- Class 31. Three miniature or miniflora blooms of any type, no foliage, floated in a 6" bowl
- Class 32. Bouquet Bowl: Five or more blooms of any type, no foliage, floated in a lotus bowl.

Child's Rose

Class 33. One bloom or spray, selected, cut, prepared and entered by a child 13 years or younger.

- Entries accepted Friday, April 19th, 4-6 pm and Saturday, April 20th, from 7-9 am and must be picked up by 4:30 pm on Sunday, April 21st. Designs may NOT be removed before 4 pm on Sunday.
- Flower Show General Rules apply. The NGC Exhibit Policies are printed in the <u>Handbook for Flower Shows</u>, Chapter 7, Exhibiting in the Design Division, NGC Policies and Guidelines.
 - Some plant material must be used in every exhibit. This includes fresh and/or dried plant material. Plant material need not have been grown by the exhibitor. Plant material and non-plant material permitted and not permitted in the Design Division are printed in the <u>Handbook for Flower</u> <u>Shows</u>, Chapter 7 (Pgs. 80-81)
 - Unless by invitation only, an exhibitor may enter multiple Classes within the Design Division, but only one (1) exhibit per class. Exhibitors must keep their entries in show condition throughout the entire show, replacing plant material if necessary prior to scheduled show hours.
 - The exhibit entered into competition must be the work of only one (1) exhibitor and that exhibitor's name must appear on the entry card. All plant material used in the design must be identified on a 3x5 card, provided by the exhibitor.
 - The exhibitor is required to conform to the stated description and limitations of the Design Type if named in the class. When design styles are required, they must be listed on a card as well.
 - If the designer is unable to fulfill the assignment, it is the designer's responsibility to provide a substitute.
 - If the designer is unavailable to transport and/or set up his/her <u>completed</u> design, a substitute person may enter the exhibit for the designer. The designer may receive exhibiting credit if needed.
 - A single flower is not a design. Container-grown plants are fresh plant
 material and are permitted in the Design Division where appropriate, but
 they are never considered floral designs.
 - Landscapes, scenes or anything representing an actual item of clothing, person, animal, etc., are not considered acceptable in the Design Division.
 - Religious symbols used in a design must be displayed in a respectful manner. The American flag and other national flags are not permitted.
- 3. Advance registration will take place electronically through Sign-up Genius.
- Rules for Design Types, Advanced Design Types, Table Designs and Table Appointments are printed in the Handbook for Flower Shows, Chapter 7 (Pgs. 63-94)
- 5. Designer is on his/her honor that the design being entered has not been previously entered or judged in an NGC Standard Flower Show.
- Scale of Points for all Designs is listed in the <u>Handbook for Flower Shows</u>. Chapter 14 (Pgs. 140-149)
- 7. In the Design Division there must be a minimum of three (3) classes in each section with four (4) entries each. The Division is judged by National Garden Club Accredited Flower Show Judges and Student Judges.

- 8. Unless prohibited, accessories and featured items are permitted (*Pg. 81 Handbook*). Drapes and underlay are permitted where stated.
- Artificial flowers and foliage are not permitted. Fresh plant material may not be dyed or otherwise treated by application of any substance. Cut fruits and vegetables are not permitted unless the exposed surface is covered with an unobtrusive sealer.
- Plants on the conservation list may not be used except for conservation displays.
 See https://wildlife.ca.gov/Conservation/Plants/Endangered for complete listing.
- 11. It is recommended that expensive and/or irreplaceable items such as heirlooms not be used. If used, they will be at exhibitor's risk. Neither the Coronado Floral Association or the City of Coronado can be responsible for the loss or damage of any such item.
- 12. A **novice** is an exhibitor that has not won a blue ribbon in a design class.
- 13. Class titles are intended to stimulate the imagination but are not to be taken literally. The designer has the freedom to choose Traditional or Creative style with any design unless prohibited by the schedule.

- Attach a filled-out entry tag to the upper left-hand corner. Entry tags available at Photography Tent. Photos must have exhibitor's name & phone number on backside of entry. No other identifying marks on the photo.
- 7. MOUNT and MAT all photos. Mat size = 11" x 14" only. Photos 8" x 10" only. Landscape or portrait. Unmatted/unmounted entries will not be exhibited. No glass or frames permitted.
- 8. Photographs can be entered in one class ONLY— no duplicate photographs are allowed and will result in neither entry being judged. **Photos entered in previous Coronado shows cannot be shown.**
- 9. Common name of flowers should be included on the entry tag.
- 10. Only judges, clerks and required committee members will be allowed in the area during judging.
- 11. First, Second, Third and Fourth place awards or no award may be given in each Class. Multiple ribbons may be awarded. Special awards: Best in Section, Best in Show, People's Choice Award.
- 12. Photos must be left in place until close of show. Pick up entries on Sunday after the show by 4 pm. If not picked up, any remaining photos become the property of the Coronado Flower Show and may be used for educational purposes. All rights to photos are retained by the photo owner. By submitting a photo to the contest, the exhibitor warrants that he/she owns the copyright of the photo and is not legally prohibited from submitting it to the contest. Exhibitor agrees to allow the CFS to display the photo at show and publish it on website. Coronado Flower Show is not responsible for the exhibits in the event of damage or loss.

FLORAL PHOTOGRAPHY

Section A: Flowers

- Class 1. **One Bloom of any variety of flower with form typical for variety.** Flower should be in top condition with no damage or deterioration showing.
- Class 2. **Flower Sprays or Clusters.** Any variety of flowers with multiple blooms in a cluster or grouping. Can be the same flower or mixed flowers.
- Class 3. **Cinderella class.** A horticultural specimen that does not fit the criteria for Classes 1 or 2 (Example: stems and foliage, thorns, seed pods, new buds, wilted flowers, etc.).

Section B: Flowers and Critters

- Class 4. Insects on or near flowers. Any type of insect, bees, butterflies, caterpillars, etc.
- Class 5. Flowers and Birds. Any type of bird on or around a flower or group of flowers.
- Class 6. Flowers and Pets. Pets of any kind interacting with flowers in the garden.

Section C: Miscellaneous

- Class 7. Cactus, any type in pot or in-ground. Can be a single specimen or multiple specimens.
- Class 8. **Succulent, any type in pot or in-ground.** Can be a single specimen or multiple specimens.
- Class 9. **Macro or Close-up.** Any kind of flower, plant or part of a plant. No insects, birds or pets.

Section D: Flower and Plant Art

The photo should evoke a sense of originality and a new and different way of imaging flowers and plants. Techniques such as colorizing, dodging, burning, layering, cloning, painting, etc. are allowed. Color, Black & White, Sepia, or combinations are permitted. Photo enhancement software is allowed. Include name of flower or plant on tag, if known.

- Class 10. **Realistic.** A plant/flower with altered but recognizable object or components. No Al
- Class 11. Abstract. A plant/flower with altered reality and not recognizable. No Al.
- Class 12. Flower(s) or plant photos partially manipulated using AI technology. Name the flower or plant on the tag and include name of AI program used. Entry cannot be totally generated using AI.

Section E: Special Challenge Classes

- Class 13. Black and White. B/W image of any type of flowers or plants.
- Class 14. **Flower Fields.** A landscape photo featuring wild flower fields, formal flower fields or even larger areas or hillsides covered with any type of flowers. Can be solid or mixed colors.
- Class 15. **Garden Reflections.** Reflections of flowers, plants, or garden in water, mirrors or windows.

Section F: Budding Photographers

Entrants age 17 and under

Class 16. One Flower or Cluster of Flowers. Any type of flower can be used.

Class 17. **Insects, birds and pets, on or near flowers.** Any type of critter on or around flowers of any kind.

Class 18. **Photo Flower Art.** Any type of photo art from Section D Classes 13-15 shown above.

Class 19. Any of the Special Challenge Classes from Section E Classes 13-15 shown above.
